A Brief Synopsis

Don Lockwood is a silent film star. He barely tolerates his vapid leading lady, Lina Lamont, who is convinced that their screen romance is real. After the first talking picture, *The Jazz Singer*, proves to be a smash hit, the head of the studio, R. F. Simpson, decides he has no choice but to convert the new Lockwood and Lamont film, *The Duelling Cavalier*, into a talkie. The production is beset with difficulties, by far the worst being Lina's comically grating voice.

After a disastrous test screening, Don's best friend, Cosmo Brown, comes up with the idea to overdub Lina's voice and they convince Simpson to turn *The Duelling Cavalier* into *The Dancing Cavalier*, a musical comedy film. Meanwhile, Don falls in love with an aspiring actress, Kathy Selden, who is



providing the voice for Lina. When Lina finds out, she is furious and does everything possible to sabotage the romance. She maliciously demands that Kathy continue to provide her voice in all future films, but remain uncredited. An irate, but



desperate Simpson is forced to agree; Kathy has no choice because she is under contract.

The premiere is a tremendous success. When the audience clamours for Lina to sing live, Don and Cosmo improvise and get Lina to lip-synch while Kathy sings into a second microphone while hidden behind the curtain. Unbeknownst to Lina, as she starts "singing", Don, Cosmo and Simpson gleefully raise the curtain behind her, revealing the deception. Kathy becomes a star, and Lina is finished.



Production Team

Lucy Seymour - *Director*

Lucy has been dancing and performing since she can remember, taking on roles such as Nancy in *Oliver!*, Reno in *Anything Goes* and Liz in *High Society*. She started directing in the late 90's with a few local societies and has since directed many musicals and Gilbert and Sullivan operettas. Her most recently directed show was *My Fair Lady* earlier this year in Maidenhead. Lucy has performed with EBOS quite a few times in the past but this is her first time directing for them.

Lucy would like to thank Mel and Bridget for being such a unique team, the people behind the scenes, without whom this show would not have happened, and also the extremely talented cast for their hard work and support and for making rehearsals so enjoyable!

Bridget Biggar - Musical Director

Bridget has worked extensively in music theatre as a musical director, director, performer and musician. Most recently she musically directed *Lucky Stiff* for her own production company, BB Theatre Productions, who performed at The Other Palace, South Hill Park and the Edinburgh Fringe.

Previous shows she has musically directed include award-winning productions of *Miss Saigon* (StageOne Youth), *Merrily We Roll Along* (BBTP) and *Follies* (EBOS). She also musically directed *Little Shop of Horrors* for EBOS in 2016.

She studied music at Hull and Durham Universities and Trinity College, and also has a Masters Degree in Applied Positive Psychology from the University of Pennsylvania.





Melinda Bennett - Choreographer

Singin' in the Rain will always be a special show for Melinda as it was the first musical she ever choreographed. Twenty years on it is the only show she has ever choreographed twice and she is thrilled to be working with some of the same performers as well as some wonderfully talented new ones.

A scientist by degree, Melinda's career is in Marketing and when she's not indulging her passion in Musical Theatre she is kept busy as a wife, mum and Brownie leader at 4th Crowthorne Brownies. She has been performing with EBOS ever since their 1997 production of *Oklahoma!* and began choreographing for them the following year. This

is the 22nd show she has choreographed for the society; some of her favourites include *Crazy for You, Guys & Dolls* and *42nd Street,* as well as the unique G&S's she has created with Duncan Hamilton and *Copacabana* and *Little Shop of Horrors,* both of which she also directed.

A big thank you to everyone who has worked so hard with their tapping and especially to those who have helped others to practice the numbers she has had such fun in creating. She hopes you enjoy the show!

Singin' in the Rain - Film Facts

1. Most of the songs used in the film aren't original

Singin' in the Rain, about a film company's transition from silent pictures to "talkies", was filmed in 1952 but takes place in the 1920s, and borrows songs made famous by older movies. For instance, *Good Morning* was performed by Judy Garland and Mickey Rooney in the 1937 film *Babes in Arms*. Garland also performed the film's title track, *Singing in the Rain*, in the 1940 film *Little Nellie Kelly*.

2. One of the "original" songs in the film is actually a rip-off

Donald O'Connor's famous rendition of *Make 'Em Laugh* is considered one of two original songs written for the film, but it's not very original at all. It owes its melody and beats to *Be a Clown* from the 1948 film *The Pirate*, performed, ironically enough, by Gene Kelly.

3. Debbie Reynolds took the bus to set

Reynolds was only 19 when she starred in *Singin'* in the *Rain* (Kelly, who plays her love interest, was 39). She still lived at home with her parents during the film's production, and took multiple buses to set every morning. Prior to her role as Kathy Selden, she had never really danced before, though her background as a gymnast helped her learn the routines. She later famously said, "*Singin'* in the *Rain* and childbirth were the two hardest things I ever had to do in my life".

4. The Production Code cost the movie a steamy moment

During the "Vamp Dance" segment of the *Broadway Melody Ballet*, a dance routine featuring Gene Kelly and Cyd Charisse, there is a cut moment that was deemed "too suggestive" by censors. The actual footage has been lost, but is believed to be a move where Charisse wraps her legs around Kelly's waist.

5. Reynolds and O'Connor were also supposed to be in the Singin' in the Rain sequence

Kelly's rain dance wasn't meant to be a solo affair. In an early draft of the script, O'Connor and Reynolds were there too, and it was to be performed when the three emerged from a restaurant after deciding to change their flop film into a musical. The scene was reworked so that it was just Kelly, and it is now legendary, as are the misconceptions about it. Though it's true that Kelly was ill during the scene (with a temperature of 103°), it's not true that he filmed his dance in one take.

6. Donald O'Connor smoked four packs of cigarettes a day during filming

O'Connor's smoking habit made his dance routines incredibly difficult. "I was smoking four packs of cigarettes a day then, and getting up those walls was murder", he said of his *Make 'Em Laugh* performance. The strenuous scene was filmed in one day and on a concrete floor. On the flip side, Cyd Charisse actually smoked her first and only cigarette during her scene in the film.

7. Debbie Reynolds took home most of the famous costumes

Reynolds was known for saving and collecting artifacts from classic films — including two pairs of ruby red slippers from *The Wizard of Oz* and Marilyn Monroe's white dress from *The Seven Year Itch* — so it's no surprise that she found herself with a number of the costumes from *Singin' in the Rain*. They were eventually sold in a 2011 auction in Hollywood to private collectors and museums.

8. Gene Kelly was known as a tyrant on set

Kelly not only starred in the film, but also co-directed it with Stanley Donen and choreographed all of the dance numbers. Because of his investment, his co-stars say he was irritable and a bit scary during filming. Donald O'Connor in particular did not enjoy working with Kelly, admitting later that he was in constant fear of getting yelled at.

Meet the Cast

Gordon Cowell - Don Lockwood

Gordon is thrilled to be playing this iconic role for the third time, the first being with Starmaker Theatre Company and the second with EBOS (alongside fellow cast member Duncan Hamilton and choreographer Melinda Bennett, and terrifyingly before some of the cast were born!). In his teens, Gordon made his professional debut in *Oliver!* at Sheffield's Crucible Theatre. Other roles with Starmaker included Edmund in *The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe* and Charlie Brown in *Snoopy*. Whilst reading Biology and French at the University of Sussex, he played Reverend Hale in *The Crucible* and Seymour in *Little Shop of Horrors*. He then trained as an actor at Mountview and appeared in the West End in *The Woman In Black* and *The Mousetrap*. Gordon moved into casting eight years ago, working on West End shows including *Jersey Boys, Kinky Boots* and *War Horse* and most recently on TV shows including

Emma Carver - Kathy Seldon




Duncan Hamilton - Dexter

Backstage Spotlight - the DSM

While you're sitting in the auditorium waiting for the show to begin, you may be reading through this programme to find out how many musical numbers there are before the interval; you may have looked down the cast list to see if there is anybody you recognise and maybe you have also looked down the list of technical crew and wondered what some of the roles entail, and maybe in particular the deputy stage manager (DSM).

The role of the DSM is extremely varied, having one foot with the backstage crew and the other foot with the director and actors throughout the rehearsal and performance periods. I have been the deputy stage manager for EBOS for over eight years now. Let me take you through the process right from the first rehearsals through to opening night.

The Rehearsal Period

Even before rehearsals begin, the stage manager and I will meet with the director and choreographer to discuss their plans for the production, to work out what technical resources we will need. We'll discuss set design, lighting and sound requirements, props and costumes. We'll continue to meet throughout the rehearsal period, gradually bringing in the required technical resource to the team.

As the DSM, my key role is to create what is known as "the book". This is a copy of the script which is annotated over time with key blocking moves and various technical cues. It is essentially the production "bible", and stays with the DSM at all times.

Moving into the Theatre

We hire the theatre for just a week, which means that we get very limited time to "get-in". We begin on the Saturday before we open, loading up a truck with the set, all the props, costumes and tools. Sunday is our busiest day - the crew have to build the set, rig the lights, gauzes, projector, set up the sound system, props, etc. All of this is done before 7pm, which is when we'll allow the actors on to the stage and begin our technical rehearsal. The whole team works painstakingly through the production, rehearsing scene changes, adding in sound effects and projections, and creating basic lighting states for each scene. We also make sure that there is enough space on stage for the choreography and time for quick costume changes.

Monday is set aside for the lighting plot. I will sit with the director and lighting designer as they create the lighting states for each scene, and add in all of the lighting cues into the book. For *Singin'* in the Rain, we also have two followspots, and these cues will be added as well.

The Dress Rehearsal

Monday night is our dress rehearsal. This is coordinated by the stage manager and DSM, and we run the show as a performance. It's our only rehearsal where we have all elements of the production together! The end of the dress rehearsal is a significant point, as the show is handed over to the DSM, and becomes his to own and control for the run.

The First Performance

It's Tuesday night and there is always great excitement and anticipation backstage. As you look at the stage tonight, I am sitting on the left-hand side, just out of view, calling the actors and crew to the stage for the start of the performance. I will also have called front of house to "encourage" the audience to take their seats.

As I get clearance from front of house, I'll give the first cues to the band, and to the sound and lighting technicians at the rear of the auditorium. The lights dim, the music begins and, after six months of hard work in rehearsal, the first performance is finally underway. I'll then follow the script, cueing the lighting changes, followspots, projections, scene changes and also speaking to the dressing rooms, usually to let the actors know that they are making too much noise backstage!

Hopefully everything will go smoothly or at least if something goes amiss we trust you won't notice. Almost before we know it, I'll be giving the final cues and the first performance is over. Just five more to go!

Jefferson's monstrous ego, vanity and insecurity are tested to the limit by the enthusiastic am-dram thespians. As acting worlds collide, and Jefferson's career implodes, he discovers some truths about himself - along with his inner Lear! Most of the action takes place in the Stratford Players' converted barn theatre which also doubles as their rehearsal space (sound familiar?). Pinewood Theatre will therefore be an additional "character" in the play for a truly immersive experience for the audience. As we follow the actors rehearsing for their potentially "final" performance the theatre will evolve from bare rehearsal room into Lear's world.


